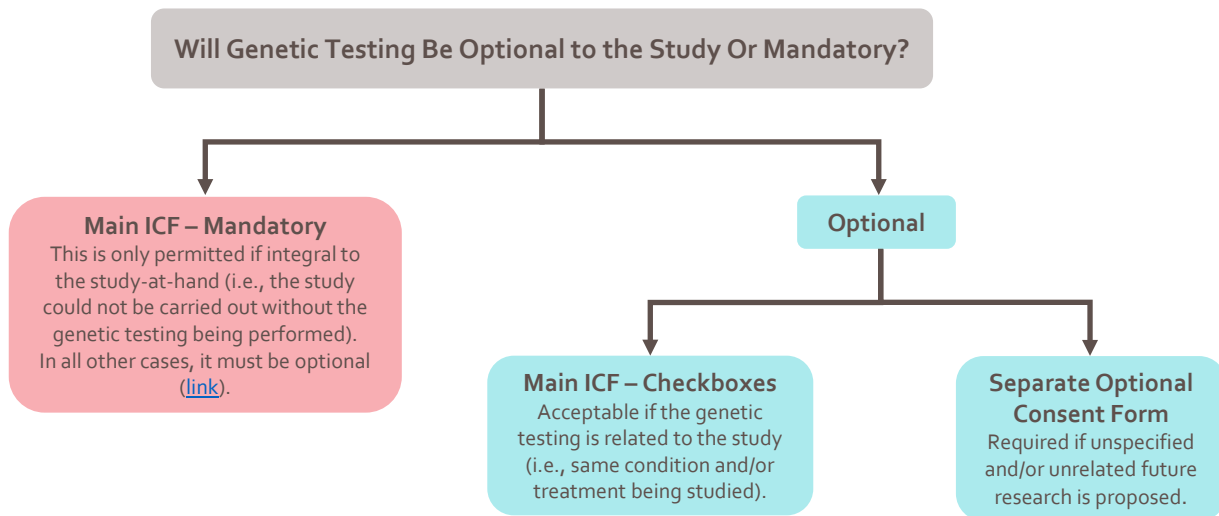


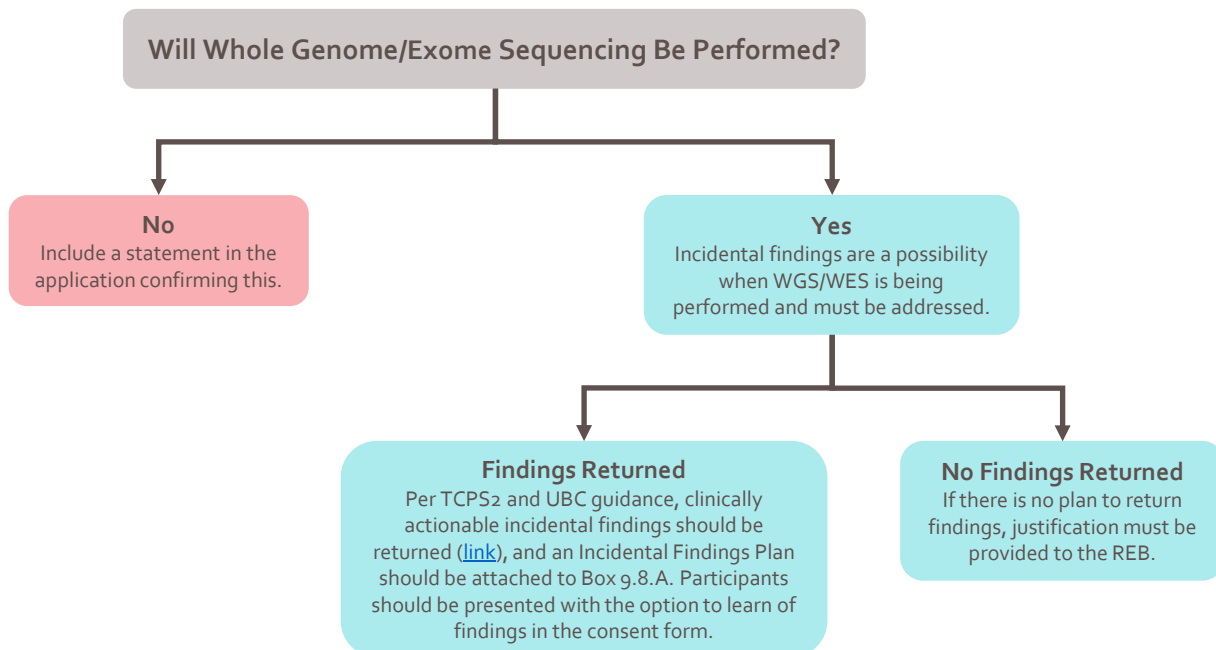
## Genetic Testing in Research

The ethics application and the informed consent form (ICF) should clearly address the genetic testing being proposed. Before submitting, verify that the following key points have been addressed with all necessary changes implemented. This will enable the REB to proceed with the ethics review more efficiently and reduce unnecessary back-and-forth.
